


Perley Lutheran Parish June 28th Lectionary 13

Children's Message

(supplies – picture of a welcome mat, welcome home sign, statue of liberty picture, picture of the red carpet)

Welcome, children of God!

I want to talk about that word today: "welcome". What do you think it means? (*Allow responses*.) You've probably heard the word plenty of times before. You might have seen it around town lately, with banners like this (*hold up a sign or picture of one, if you have one*), "Welcome Back!"

Restaurants and stores that have been closed are eager to welcome people back to do business. Or maybe someone you love has travelled, and when they return, you make a sign that says "welcome home." Perhaps you have a mat like this (*demonstrate if available*) in front of your house, that says "welcome."

Maybe you've seen celebrities on TV being welcomed with a big red carpet! The dictionary defines the word as a "friendly greeting", or as someone or something that is "gladly received." When we welcome others, we communicate to them that they are valued and that we are glad to see or be with them.

Sometimes, though, these types of signs and words can be a little deceiving. We might say "welcome," but only receive people under certain conditions. These signs around town might welcome people back into stores...but only if you're wearing a mask, and you haven't been sick in recent months. The doormat might say "welcome"....but not if you smell bad, or if you're trying to sell something or tell something. You know, even in our nation's history, we see a lot of mixed message welcomes. For example, do you recognize this? (*Hold up picture of the Statue of Liberty*)

It's called the Statue of Liberty. It stands in the harbor outside New York, right by a place called Ellis Island. The statue is a symbol of freedom, and it even has a poem on it welcoming people who are tired and yearn to be free. It was the first thing that immigrants saw when they moved to the United States from other countries. But they would pass through this processing place called Ellis Island, where they were screened, and sometimes sent back home, if they didn't have good health, or plans, or enough money. Even if they made it through, these immigrants were often treated poorly by other people. Sometimes Americans refused to give them jobs or food or a place to stay. I wish that were ancient history, but it still happens.

Some people do not want to welcome others who aren't like them. Unfortunately, this can even happen in churches. We might say we welcome everyone, but if people look a certain way, they might be treated negatively or feel cast out.

This is not what Jesus wanted. To be sure, we need to make sure that we stay safe. We can't just throw open the doors of our houses to anyone who might walk in and do something evil. We do want to wear masks and make sure we're feeling healthy for the sake of other people. And we need to monitor the situation of our country and population.

However, we are called to communicate to others that they are gladly received. Jesus told people that when we receive and welcome others, it's like we are welcoming Him, and welcoming "the One who sent Him." Well, that would of course be God Himself! He said that we will receive blessing for welcoming others, whoever they are. Jesus had a reputation for welcoming people who might otherwise be looked down on. He demonstrated love for children, even though kids in that time were not too valued. He went to people who were sick and hurting, outcasts of society and those who had done wrong. Jesus cared for them and loved them. He welcomed them into God's family.

We can rejoice in this, because we know that He welcomes us. He loved us enough to die for us, allowing us to be a welcome part of the Kingdom of Heaven. His arms are wide open for us to rush into in blessed embrace. We also know that He wants us to welcome others. Now, we might not be able to give out hugs just yet, with current concerns...but we can still invite people to church, and give them a hearty wave and welcome when they come.

If we can't welcome folks into our homes, maybe we can send cards and calls. We can remind others that they are valued and loved. And, of course, the best thing we can do is pray! Ask God to bring people into His family, and give thanks for helping us to be part of that process. Why don't we say a word of prayer right now?

Message:

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen

I love this passage – it's one of my favorite Gospel passages as it's one of those readings that always inspires me and one that I try to remind myself of and live in as much as possible. I don't know if you've ever heard the term "servant evangelist" or not. I honestly hadn't until I started doing some reading for my message. Essentially what "servant evangelism" means is

the showing of the love of God through our own caring and loving actions toward others. I other words – it's in doing for others as God would do for us. It can be something small and seemingly insignificant to you but may mean the world to someone else or it can be something extreme or extravagant so all can see. In our Gospel today it's about providing a cup of water.

Of course this passage isn't really about a cup of water, sharing a drink with someone, but rather about sharing ourselves, living a life as a Christian, living in relationship with our neighbors and with God. Jesus is talking about us being humble, being giving and sharing a piece of ourselves with others. Let's look at this a bit more.

I don't know about you but when I do for others it really is makes me feel good. It's not about doing something for someone because I am better than them, I have more than them or anything like that – it's about knowing that whatever I may have done has helped someone in some way.

One of my all-time favorite movies is called "Pay it Forward". It's got great actors and actresses in it and has a wonderful story about a young boy named Trevor. Trevor lives in an family that is far from normal or perfect- he is being raised by single mom who works two jobs and drinks far too much. One of Trevor's teacher assigns a project to his social studies course – all students are to create and put into an action a plan that will change the world for the better. Trevor devises a plan that is based on a networking of people doing good deeds. He calls his plan "pay it forward" and the premise is that the person who has something good done for them must do something for three others – rather than re-paying the good deed they received.

The story goes on with how those "good deeds" received by one gets given to three others and how through all of the drama that is going on in Trevor's life – the paying it forward comes full-circle and because I will not wreck it for those who haven't seen the movie – I will just say that there is tears in my eyes every single time I get to the end of this movie.

I know that I have been the one in the drive up who left an extra \$20 for the next car or two to get a treat on my payment in hopes that they too will keep the gesture going and pay it forward sometime. I have also been the recipient of someone doing that for me and it's such a wonderful feeling to be a part of caring for one another. It's really a fun and easy way to share that "cup of water" that Jesus is talking about it in this passage.

There was a story or more an example of a dilemma that one may encounter and a question on how we should respond. It goes like this:

Consider you are driving down the road in your car on a windy and stormy evening. As you pass by a bus stop, you see that there three people seated in this rainy, windy spot. The first person you notice is an older woman who looks gravely ill – like she's not going to be around much less alive for much longer. The next person you see is an old friend of years who at one-

time actually saved your life. Finally, the last person sitting there is your soul-mate, the man or woman that you have been waiting and dreaming about your whole life. Here's the dilemma – you have a two-seater – and you know that there is only one seat that is open – which one of these three are you going to pick up and give a ride?

You could pick up the older woman – she is really sick and you should save her life. Then again, you owe your friend as they saved you once so you should really return the favor, right?? But what about the final person there – the person you were meant to live your life with – how can you pass by that person? It really is a dilemma isn't it? All three of these persons are worthy of a ride, worthy of your care and worthy of a chance to get out of the storm. Believe it or not, there is an answer that may make you feel better about the decision.

What if, you give the keys to your dear friend (that repays the favor of his life-saving) and ask them to take the older woman (who clearly needs to be taken somewhere for medical care) and that leaves you to hang out with the person of your dreams while the two of you wait for the bus. HA HA – sounds good doesn't it? What it takes is taking a look outside of the box – the norm or the expected.

That's where our passage is trying to take us. Jesus is pushing us all to do the small things – share a cup of water – to show God's love at work. For this passage it's a cup of water, in other passage it is Jesus washing the feet of his disciples and telling them to go out and love and serve others. Even those small and simple things, those little acts of kindness, can touch and transform a life.

Little and simple acts of kindness – done with love – can also change the world, like Trevor was trying to do in the movie I mentioned. Our passage says "whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward." Think about how Jesus came to us – the Son of God didn't show up with a grand display of trumpets blasting or anything extravagant – he came as a baby in a manger in a stable. He touched all of those he met exactly at the point they needed in their lives; to heal, to comfort, to provide and to change their lives. He came to give His life for ours, to take away our sins and to change this world. That's what God wants of us – to change the world and to do as God has done.

It's important for us, however, to remember that this is not about us and the good deeds we are doing. We've talked about this many times — we can't earn our way into heaven. Our good deeds don't give us a one-track ticket to the pearly gates. We get into heaven not by what we do but by what Christ has done in and for us. The power that we receive by living our lives in love towards God and others is God working in our hearts and in our hands. As I mentioned last Wednesday in our mid-week devotion, we should "just say it" when it comes to telling people we care for that we love them and for this passage we should "just do it". Sharing God in simple and practical ways — giving a drink to those who are thirsty, or a

meal to those that hunger, or a prayer for those who need strength, or an ear for those who need someone to listen, or a ride to someone who shouldn't be out in the rainy storm and so many, many other ways is a call to simply just do it. Remember though why we do it.

Remember that our actions are God working through us and that even when those acts are small and simple you can discover the great life of sharing Jesus in and for the lives of others. Let's get out there and do it and pay it forward! Amen

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
