

Children's Message

Have you ever heard of Fanny J. Crosby? Fanny was a hymn writer and poet who wrote over 8,000 hymns! I looked through this hymnal that I brought with me this morning and I discovered that there are seventeen hymns

in this hymnal written by Fanny J. Crosby. A very short list of the most popular hymns written by Fanny would include such great hymns as "To God Be the Glory," "I Am Thine, O Lord," "Tell Me the Story of Jesus," "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross," and "All the Way My Savior Leads Me." You may be surprised to learn that Fanny was totally blind. She lost her sight when she was only six weeks old through the negligence of a doctor who was treating an inflammation in her eyes.

Because she was blind, I am sure that many times Fanny heard the words, "You can't do this" or "You can't do that." One reason I feel sure she heard those words is that she once wrote a song entitled, "Never Give Up!" The words to the refrain of that song go like this:

Never give up, never give up, Never give up to thy sorrows, Jesus will bid them depart; Trust in the Lord, trust in the Lord, Sing when your trials are greatest, Trust in the Lord and take heart.

Fanny never gave up! "Blindness," she wrote, "cannot keep the sunlight of hope from the trusting soul." Fanny had great faith in God and put her trust in him to get her through the obstacles she faced in her life. She never gave up!

Our Bible lesson today tells about another woman who had great faith and refused to give up. The Bible doesn't tell us her name, it simply calls her "a Canaanite woman." That means that she was a Gentile and, as you know, Jesus and his disciples were Jews. The Jews would have very little to do with gentiles. The Canaanite woman met Jesus one day as he was traveling in the region of Tyre and Sidon. She came toward him crying out, "Have mercy on me, for my daughter is possessed by an evil spirit."

Jesus did not reply to the woman and his disciples came to him complaining that she was bothering them and asked him to tell her to leave. Jesus said to the woman, "I was sent only to help God's lost sheep—the people of Israel."

But she came and worshiped him, pleading again, "Lord, help me!"

Jesus replied, "It isn't right to take food from the children and throw it to the dogs."

The woman answered, "That's true Lord, but even dogs are allowed to eat the scraps that fall beneath their masters' table."

"Dear woman," Jesus said to her, "your faith is great. Your request is granted." At that very moment, her daughter was healed.

What if she had given up? What if her faith had not been so strong? The end of this story would be quite different, wouldn't it? Let us follow the example set by Fanny Crosby and the Canaanite woman. Let's "Keep the Faith" and "Never Give Up!"

Father, we place our faith and trust in you. When we face obstacles and trials in our daily life, help us to keep our faith in you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

Message

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen

Our Gospel this morning has Jesus withdrawing to the region of Tyre and Sidon. He's been quite busy the last few weeks in the Lakes area with calming the storms in the lives of the disciples and feeding those who were hungry and following him. It also was a time when some of the Pharisees and teachers put a bit of pressure on Jesus not to upset the norm too much. They urged him to keep things as they were – same old habits of the people and the same ways that things had always been done.

Jesus has now crossed over into the region of Tyre and Sidon – a region that isn't home anymore or familiar and safe to him. This region was diverse – different people, different languages, different beliefs and different values. They pretty much did everything different and therefore this visit wouldn't be an easy "status quo of operation" for Jesus in this different place. Most importantly, this region would've not been one that any Isrealite would've even ventured to go to much less been accepted back home very easily once they had. Nevertheless, Jesus disregarded the "rules" that his people had made and went there.

We really don't have any idea if any of those same Pharisees and teachers followed Jesus there – our passage doesn't give us any information about them - but we do know that his disciples did. Jesus and the disciples went there to be with a small community of Israelites who had made their home together in that region. It was a prosperous and successful business region that had brought the Israelites there and their community did as most Israelite communities did – they worshipped regularly just as they had been taught. Unfortunately, they did so without their hearts being in it. This community had turned their hearts away from God and they began to see much suffering, little compassion and definitely no love of neighbor. Jesus knew he was going to have his hands full – he would need to heal them, give them hope and most of all turn their hearts back to the love of God.

Then comes a Canaanite woman. She is crying and pleading "Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me! My daughter is tormented by a demon." Who was she? She would've been a "local" and native to that area. In regards to status for the Isrealites – she would've been of lower status and therefore one that they would most likely ignore and avoid. She also would've been a woman who looked tired and worn out. Years of dealing with her possessed daughter, years of struggling to find help for her and years of being avoided would've worn on her and you would've been able to know that just by looking at her. She would've been there in desperation and of course, the disciples who seem to think at times that they need to protect Jesus, would've tried and urged Him to send her away – get rid of her.

She, however was persistent. She knew she wasn't going to receive a warm welcome from the Isrealites. Yet she knew who Jesus was. She had heard the stories of miracles and healings of others. She had even heard the calls that he is the Messiah. Sure, she would've compared him to the many other "healers" who had assured her they could help, but this time Jesus shone above all the rest. This time she had hope that it would be different. After all, Jesus has shown compassion to all people wherever he has gone, she must then believe that Jesus is the Lord and Savior and could help like the others had not been able to do.

I think it was her belief. I think her knowing of and understanding that Jesus was the Lord of all – remember she didn't call out his name for help or "hey you" – she called out "Lord, Son of David have mercy on me". She believed he was the Messiah.

And yet, Jesus did not say a word or as our passage said "He did not answer her at all." God did not answer – there was silence. In the midst of her suffering, God did not answer. I am well aware of that feeling as I'm sure you are too. How many times have you found yourself on your knees praying to God in the midst of suffering only to find silence in your prayers? It was the same, however for Jesus when he too prayed in the garden amongst the suffering and God was silent then as well.

The faith that Jesus had in his Father in heaven gave him strength to cross from that fear of meeting death to the cross for you and I. Faith in Jesus, in God, helps us to endure the suffering because we know that death is never final if you believe. We too are promised the new life from the grave.

Now for the rest of the story. Jesus answers the woman "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." He had answered her and that in itself had to be a ray of hope for her — but his answer wasn't going to be enough for her. She knew why she had come and she knew she must continue so she came even closer and knelt before him in prayer. "Lord help me."

Again Jesus replies to her, "It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to their dogs." And the persistence continues as she responds with "Yes, Lord, but even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." And he knows it when he replies to her "Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted" and instantly the daughter is healed.

Jesus is using this story to show us the woman's great faith – through all of the suffering and loss and pain – she has kept her faith and now He puts it on display for all to see. True, there is a bit of oddity in that he compares the faith of the woman to the faith of the family pet – a dog. However, if you've ever had or known someone with a dog, one you know that they are faithful. They know their owner, their nature and habits, and how they will care for them and they therefore know they too can put their trust in their master.

When Jesus gave this woman the bread of the "children" as he put it – he was in inviting her to the table – to the fellowship of all of the other children. This woman's invitation invited her to receive all that the rest of the believers received. She has essentially been adopted into the family of God because her belief was strong and she did not waiver.

That idea, that example, is good news for all of us too. Through the loving grace and mercy that Jesus has for us we too can be invited to the table. We too can be in fellowship with him and the believers. We too can receive great blessings no matter who we are, what language we speak, what color of skin we have, what our house-hold income is, which neighborhood we are from the list goes on and on. Jesus will accept EVERYONE!

Faith in Jesus brought his woman into the presence of God. Her belief and faith please Jesus and he blessed her and invited her to be in fellowship with him. It's exactly the same for you and me. We just have to have faith – good faith – no wait, great faith!

Faith that keeps us believing in our suffering even when we only hear the silence. Faith that reminds us that death is not the end for us – that we have been promised life ever-lasting. Faith that brings us hope when we feel like there is no answers, no healing and no options. Faith that can bring us courage and peace. Faith that can bring great love and compassion into our lives and our communities and our country and our world. And most of all – a great faith that comes from believing in Jesus is the Lord of All. Yes, ALL!


