

Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other slaves, saying, 'Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet.' But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his slaves, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, 'The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the main streets and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.' Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests. "But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, and he said to him, 'Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' For many are called, but few are chosen."

# Children's Message

Have any of you have ever given a party? Of course you have! We have all given a party at some time. Perhaps it was a birthday party, or a slumber party. Maybe you had a picnic or a costume party. No matter what kind of party you give, it is a lot of work to get ready for a party, isn't it? First, you have to decide what kind of a party you are going to have. Then you have to go out and buy the decorations or make them yourself. You have to plan what games you are going to play and make sure that you have all of the proper equipment for the games. Next you have to decide what you are going to serve and go to the store to buy refreshments. After you have made all the plans, you make a list of who you are going to invite and send out the invitations.

Have you ever planned a party and sent out the invitations, but no one showed up? Oh, I hope not! If that happened, how do you think it would make you feel? Would you be angry? Would your feelings be hurt? What do you think you might do?

Jesus once told about a king who threw a party, but none of the people he invited showed up for his party. In Jesus' story, the king was going to have a party for his Son who was getting married. Since he was a king, and this was his only son, you can imagine that it was going to be quite a celebration and it was a tremendous honor to be invited!

All of the plans had been made, the food was prepared, the invitations had been sent. The day of the celebration came, but no one showed up! The king sent his servants to see where the people were and why they had not come to his celebration. The people all began to make excuses about how busy they were.

The king was very upset, so he told his servants to go out into the streets and invite everyone they saw to come to his son's wedding celebration. They did exactly what the king told them to do and the Bible tells us that the wedding hall was filled with guests.

In this story, the King is God and, of course, Jesus is His Son. God is going to have a great celebration for His Son in Heaven and we have all been invited. I can't imagine why, but some people will turn down God's invitation. You've been invited -- I hope you will accept God's invitation.

Dear Father, thank you for inviting us to join you in your heavenly celebration. If there are any here today who have not accepted your invitation, we pray that today will be the day. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

The Parable of the Wedding Banquet – yes, we have another parable. As I was preparing for my message today I found a definition or explanation of what a Parable is and what is intend to be for us. It's written by a man named Martin Eligar and I'd like to share it with you as we continue to look at the parables and try to understand what Jesus is teaching us through them.

At times Jesus spoke in parables. Parables begin as earthly stories, speaking about things we are familiar with, like a wedding banquet. There is a twist to the story that can turn up side down our familiar understanding and reveal something new. They end with the intent to reveal something spiritual, something about God's kingdom. Parables are very much like a riddle designed to tease us into seeking the spiritual truth, the Word of God. God promises to those who seek, who knock that they will find and the door will be opened to them. With perseverance a person can be rewarded with a wonderful treasure when confronted with a parable from Jesus. I thought that really wrapped up what these beautiful and riddling stories are really all about.

Our parable today is all about a wedding. I sang and played for a wedding yesterday for a dear friend and will be officiating for another wedding next Saturday. They are so wonderful, so beautiful, so fun, so...... Let's be honest, they really are a lot of work! Think about all those plans and those RSVPs. If you haven't been involved in the plans – it is almost impossible to get those RSVPs sent back – and truthfully I am bad at responding myself at times. It's hard to plan though if you don't know who and how many are coming. How do you order food? How do you plan a seating arrangement? It's just hard to plan period if you don't hear back from your guests. This concept is a bit like the people in our parable today who don't bother to RSVP.

I have to admit I am mesmerized by the Royal Family of Great Britain. I was glued to my TV when Charles and Diana got married in 1981, I literally bawled when Diana was killed. I watched as William married Kate in 2011and as Harry married Megan in 2018 – hard to believe that's over two years already. All that regal pomp and circumstance that went into those grand affairs. Millions of us watched on our TVs but you know not all of us had to watch it that way, some actually received invitations to these weddings – some rich, some famous, some powerful and of course, some royal. It would be something you clearly wouldn't ignore – an invite to a Royal Wedding would be something of honor and duty to attend. Our Gospel is a lot like these types of weddings. Our story has a king and is the wedding is of a son amongst other similarities we will see.

We are now on week 3 of Gospels having Jesus still at the temple and still confronting the leaders and priests over who has authority. Each and every parable Jesus is sharing is shaming and insulting them more and more and their anger continues to grow more and more with every word spoken. So as we look at our parable for this morning we need to keep that image and idea of confrontation front and center in our minds when looking at the purpose and meaning for this in our lives today.

Honestly, this is one of the harder parables to figure out. The king in this parable is identified by Jesus as the Kingdom of heaven. This king is not only kind and benevolent God but also a god who violently reacts to people who don't RSVP for the wedding banquet. This king invites EVERYONE – the good, the bad and the ugly as we've heard jokingly said at times – he invites us all and yet not ALL respond. What's worse is that someone did respond and comes under-dressed causing quite a commotion for the king. So much so that the King throws him out into the darkness. And what about the very last line of our parable "for many are called, but few are chosen" – to me that is not only unsettling but really confusing. All of the King's actions and reactions seem to be a bit much for my understanding. Can you imagine going to a wedding today and literally calling someone out to leave because they weren't wearing the right things? Or killing people because they didn't respond to their invitations? Burned down their dwellings and their cities because they didn't make the ceremony? Seems a bit extreme to all of us doesn't it??

We do however, need to remember that this wedding is taking place in the Middle East where their society is built around honor and yes, shame. Those that would've said no to the invitation would've brought shame to the king and he would therefore need to attempt to restore his honor. In that same line of thinking then Jesus is telling the religious leaders and Priests in the temple that they too have insulted and brought shame to God because of what they are doing in temple (their self-centered and twisted religious doings) and how they are rejecting God's son. Still, it seems a stretch for me to figure out how this can apply to my life today – how about you??

The Parable – our story – begins with a party. A celebration fit for a king and the marriage of his son. This is an image, in a sense, of how Jesus is portraying heaven. More than just those pearly gates we've been hearing about. More than just roads of gold and fluffy clouds. Heaven is a celebration – a celebration that we can all look to as an eternal party of life and grace. But wait – we really don't have to wait for that party until we die as we HAVE been invited to the party to celebrate life and grace right now.

You can find it over and over again in scripture where we are called to celebrate, to praise the Lord, to give thanks, and to worship God's love and grace in our lives. That never-ending presence of God in our lives should be celebrated daily, right? Sure we aren't always going to feel like partying, dancing and celebrating – there are indeed those times that aren't so easy or very good – but we can still live each and every date grateful and thankful for the gifts God has given us. The king in our story expands the invitation when he realizes some have ignored the invite to the good AND the bad. Everyone is invited to celebrate and even when God is shamed that doesn't mean he isn't still inviting ALL of us.

Think about the many times that you – and I have refused the invitation, or forgot to send the RSVP when God has asked us to celebrate and live our lives in gratitude. There are always those times when our worlds seem to be falling apart. Perhaps you find yourself overwhelmed and succumbing to the pressures of worry and concern. Listen for that whisper. That promise from God that "It's Ok, I've got you covered." The invite we all receive is to let go of what we worry and rather replace it with peace and joy and love. Celebrate the fact that you are never alone!

Or maybe its those times when you never seem to have enough time. Always rushing here and there getting to the next stop as quickly as possible and not taking the time to appreciate the journey. I have to admit this is a big one for me! God's with us in these crazy times to tell us to slow down – smell the roses as some may say. Celebrate life and remember to care for yourself. After all, even Jesus took some time for himself when he left the crowds to go away to rest and to pray. Allow yourself to put the brakes on now and then for you and for the time to accept the invitation to celebrate.

Maybe it's about times when you have been hurt or offended. Times when you or someone holds a grudge, withholds the forgiveness needed and limits the love that you share or are given. Jesus tells us to let go of those times too. Forgive or be forgiven and celebrate that same gift of love and forgiveness and grace that you have been promised too. Just like these times and all the rest – being a disciple of God is saying "yes" to the invitation – saying "yes" to the celebration.

The king in our story may have handled things a bit extreme – responded too aggressively and taken things far too personally. But the real King, the Lord of lords does the opposite – the King of kings acts

graciously and loving to us. God continually sends us invitations to the feast and to celebrate. All we need to do is accept the invitation. So will you RSVP? Amen




