

"For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

Children's Message

Think about some of the special gifts or talents God gave you. (Allow time.) Let's look in my gift box to see what I'm talking about. (Open the gift box and pull out a card.) Maybe God has gifted you with a musical talent like singing or playing an instrument. (Invite kids to sing a few notes, such as "Doe, ray, me!") Some of you

may have been given athletic skills which make you very good at playing a sport. (Invite kids to pretend to shoot a basket.) Maybe you have intellectual gifts; so you do very well in school. (Have kids make a book shape with their hands and pretend to read.) Some of you may have artistic talents and can paint, draw, or sculpt. (Have kids pretend to paint a picture.) Some of you may be good at dancing or acting. (Invite kids to stand up and do a quick dance move.) Let's see what your talent is. Repeat the action we did for your greatest area of talent. (Pause for kids to respond.) No matter what gifts God gave you, I know He's given each and every one of you at least one special gift or talent.

When God gives you a gift, He expects you to use it. He doesn't want the gift to go to waste. God wants you to take that gift and use it to show others how great He is. That's what our Bible lesson is about today.

In the Bible, Jesus tells many parables. Parables are stories that teach a lesson. Today, we'll hear Jesus' parable called "The Parable of the Talents."

Jesus' story starts with a man who went off on a long trip. (Have kids pretend to throw a backpack over their shoulder.) Before he left, he called his servants together and gave each of them a part of his wealth to take care of while he was gone. To one he gave five bags of gold, to another two bags, and to a third he gave one bag. Then he left on his journey.

While he was gone, the servant who had five bags of gold worked hard and doubled his five bags so he ended up with ten bags of gold. (Invite kids to cheer for the man who used his talents.) The man with two bags also doubled his; so he had four. (Invite kids to cheer for the second man who used his talents.) But the servant with one bag dug a hole and buried his boss's money. (Invite kids to show thumbs down.)

When the boss returned, he asked his servants to share what they did with the gifts he gave them. The boss told the two who doubled their bags, "Well done! Because you have used what I gave you well, I will give you much more."

Then the third servant told the boss, "I was afraid, so I took what you gave me and hid it in the ground so that it would be safe."

"You lazy servant!" the boss answered. "You could have at least put the gold in the bank so that I could have earned a little interest on it." The boss took the gold from the servant and gave it to the one who already had the most. He explained, "To those who make what they have been given better will be given more. But from those who do nothing, theirs will be taken away."

Sometimes we might think God hasn't given us very much talent. We might even be tempted to hide our talent. But when we use our God-given talent to be all that God planned for us to be, He will give us even more!

Dear God, we thank You for the gifts You've given each of us. We pray that we will be faithful in using these gifts to show others how wonderful You are. In Jesus' name, amen.

Message

Grace and Peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen!

The Parable of the Talents – some of you may remember that we heard a message just a few weeks ago during my installation, when Pastor Taylor Wilson spoke to us about this passage. As I struggled this week with all that is going on in this world - in our communities with Covid cases, in my College position – I'm in the

middle of a big audit for a process that I just took over a couple of weeks ago so am really stressing about things – and in our churches as we continue to have to adjust and change to how to serve our members and watchers and still stay safe, a new plan for Thanksgiving, a possible new plan for Christmas – I found myself really having a hard time buckling down to get this message on paper. It is with this admittance that I acknowledge a Pastor Kevin Ruffcorn whose message I found very helpful when penning this one for you today. There are those days when you need to rely on some help from others and this was one of those days for me.

Let's begin with a story. Alexander Solzhenitsyn (Soul-Jen-its-in) was a prisoner in Russia. He was on a program of hard labor and slow starvation. One day he felt like giving up. He felt his life could not make a difference. He sat down on a bench knowing that when he was spotted by a guard he would be ordered back to work when he failed to respond the guard would bludgeon him to death. As he sat waiting, head down, he felt a presence. Slowly he lifted his eyes. Next to him sat an old man with a wrinkled, utterly expressionless face. Hunched over, the old man drew a stick through the sand at Solzhenitsyn's feet deliberately tracing out the sign of the cross. As Solzhenitsyn stared at the rough outline his entire perspective shifted. Yet in that moment, he knew that the hope of all mankind was represented by that simple cross - and through its power anything was possible.

Solzhenitsyn slowly got up, picked up his shovel and went back to work - not knowing that his writings on truth and freedom would one day enflame the whole world.

Many of you may have heard Steve Jobs talk about facing death prior to his loss of battling cancer and how knowing he was facing this deadly disease changed his perspective on life. He valued each and every day he had, he refused to follow trivial pursuits or to do what he didn't want to do, and he took risks and wasn't afraid of failure. Steve Jobs' change in perspective enabled him to do great things in life.

Many of us can attest to the power of a perspective change. When we see the world differently, we live differently. It has been said that perception is reality. A rollercoaster can be either scary or thrilling—it depends on how you perceive it. I admit — I perceive it scary at all times. HA HA With this "Parable of the Talents," Jesus invites his followers to see life from a different perspective.

Jesus speaks these words to his disciples – those mish mash of men who have left everything to go and follow him. Those faithful disciples who before much longer will find themselves without Jesus to lead them. Now clearly, that is going to be a very different perspective for them to see life through. They won't have Jesus, they will have to wait before they are gifted the Spirit – remember Jesus comes and brings that to them after he has risen – and most important is they WILL suffer, be persecuted and ridiculed because of their faith in the Son.

Life wasn't easy for the early Christians – many times people who believed in Christ would find themselves separated from not only society but even their families. Authorities would persecute them for not following in line with what those in power wanted them to be and do. There was even fighting between the Christians – Jewish and Gentile Christians – having different ideas on how evangelism should happen and how aggressive they needed to be to unite as one. Things back then were in a bit of a turmoil – trying to view life in a good and united way wasn't easy. Sound familiar??? Boy we can sure understand that feeling these past few months, right?? What and how we make things better and be more kind is all about perspective. Do we want to wallow in the pain, hurt and unkindness or do we want to look at our life and our world in a positive and perhaps changing way?

Do we look at life with the glass empty mantra – we don't have this, we want that, we can't get this, we should've been given this, we earned that and we deserve this? We place our perspective on a lens of scarcity – what we are missing – rather than on what we have.

Perhaps we look at live through the perspective of abundance. The master in our story entrusted all of his wealth to his servants. In this world we live in – one in which we are impatient and want things to happen and be right now – the idea of abundance for a long period of time, like the servants were given, is hard for most of us to understand. Think about a talent being the same as five years of wages – that's a lot of money!!!! This master is inviting his servants to live a life of abundance – have what they need and be taken care of. He isn't just giving them economic and physical wealth but he is given them a fullness – an abundance of God's grace, and steadfast love, and unconditional forgiveness. A life of abundance in which we can celebrate that God's is in our lives and with us always. If we think about the talents in OUR lives then it would be in allowing God's do adventures with us and us allowing our talents to be at God's disposal. The talents in this passage aren't about our natural abilities but rather about God's life and power and how we should allow God's hands to use our talents – our abilities.

The servants who did this – used them wisely – increased them and were invited to celebrate with the master. The joy of the master was in a feast of self-giving and sharing and distributing to others. Just like all that was gained by the disciples when they left it all behind to follow Jesus. The gain was greater than the loss. But we know – there was one servant who didn't get to see the abundance that was his.

What if we consider this parable as a parable of invitation? Perhaps the third servant's plight takes on a different perspective. If, the master is inviting, continually inviting into superabundance, grace, and joy (which is nothing other than inviting into discipleship) then the only conclusion that can be drawn is the third servant is not able to hear or accept the invitation. The third servant has not only hidden the talent, he has buried HIMSELF. The third servant is seeing things more in the scarcity more – condemning himself to a place – a life – that knows not joy, that knows only darkness, and that know no grace.

Could God become for us what we believe God to be? For those who believe God to be gracious, giving, and forgiving; to them God is that. For those who believe God to be hard, demanding, and judgmental; to them God is that. I honestly think that our inadequate beliefs, our skewed perceptions, shape how we view God and his activity in our lives.

We all know a little something about limited wealth in our country, but there are also illustrations of things that when given away do not diminish. Imagine a candle lighting service for instance. When one person shares the light of a candle with another person, the first person's light isn't diminished in any way; and there is now twice as much light in the place. Another example may be the love of a parent for a new addition to the family – it doesn't diminish the love they have for the child or children that came before.

Could not the same thing be said of sharing love? Or sharing the gospel? Our ability to love doesn't diminish by sharing it; and there will be more love in the world. The power of the gospel is not diminished by sharing it; and there could be more believers in the world. Now more than ever — let's find ourselves sharing the love of God and the light of hope. Let us celebrate and bear witness to our abundance!






