P And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

# Message: Her Firstborn Son

Were Adam and Eve proud of their firstborn son, Cain? Perhaps not later in life, but surely they were proud when he was born, proud and grateful to God. At Cain's birth, Eve said, "I have gotten a man with the help of the Lord" (Genesis 4:1). She may have thought that this—already!—was the child that God promised to send, the child of the woman who would destroy the tempting serpent. Perhaps this was the child who would undo the terrible damage done in Eden, the child who would restore what was lost. But the time for that child of promise had not yet come.

Those first parents may have had high hopes for their firstborn son, but those hopes would not be fulfilled. Instead of destroying the tempting serpent, Cain, like his parents before him, fell to the serpent's power. Cain grew jealous of his younger brother Abel because the Lord received Abel's offering, but not Cain's, with favor. Cain acted out of his jealous anger and murdered his brother. As Adam and Eve had been sent out of Eden, so the Lord sent Cain away from his home.

Generations later, another child of promise appeared. This was the son promised to Abraham and Sarah, parents too old to have children. But the Lord fulfilled his promise and the son was born. The child was named Isaac, a name that means "he laughs," a reminder that his parents had laughed at the promise of his birth to such an elderly couple, only to laugh with joy and delight at his birth. Yet once again it appeared that the story of this firstborn son was not going to turn out well either.

God commanded Abraham to offer up Isaac, his only son, as a sacrifice. So, trusting in the promise, trusting a God who could even raise up the dead, Abraham obeyed the Lord's command. Isaac went along willingly, believing what his father Abraham told him: "God will provide for himself the lamb for a burnt offering." The God who demanded a sacrifice would supply that sacrifice. As Abraham took up the knife to kill his son, an angel called out to stop him. God provided a ram for Abraham to offer up instead of his son. On that mountaintop place of death, God provided a sacrifice.

There are some researchers who make much of birth order, suggesting that the order of birth—firstborn, middle child, youngest child—determines the personality and behavior of a child. Whether we agree or not, one does not have to find a special place in the family birth order to receive the stain of sin passed down from Adam and Eve. Sons and daughters of our first parents, like Cain, we too bear that stain, and like Cain, we express our sin in our thoughts, words and actions. No, we may not physically go to the level that they did back them – we don't go around taking the lives of those we don't like. Scripture leaves no doubt about our sin and we really do have more in common with Cain than we would like to admit. We too grow jealous of what others have or are, of others who have what we think we deserve. Firstborn or not, sin stains our lives. Cain did not live up to the expectations of Adam and Eve. We do not, we cannot, live up to our heavenly Father's expectations, for as Jesus said, "You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). The penalty for anything less than perfection—as Adam and Eve learned so long before in the garden—is death.

Yet just as he did for Abraham and Isaac, the Lord does for us. What God demands he provides. He demands perfection and he provided a perfect son, his only Son: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." God offered up his only Son as a sacrifice in our place, for our sins. God kept the promise he had made to Adam and Eve, that a child of the woman would come to crush the power of the tempting serpent. God kept his promise to Abraham, that out of the nation formed of his descendants would come a blessing to every nation, to every family on earth. When the time was right, God sent his perfect Son, born of a woman, Mary of Nazareth. God's only Son was Mary's firstborn son, born in Bethlehem. She wrapped her precious son in swaddling

cloths and laid him in a manger.

When he was grown, this firstborn son of Mary would be offered up as a sacrifice on the altar of a cross. Like his ancestor Isaac, he too would carry the wood for the offering, in this case a cross, to the place of death. He would humbly submit to his Father's will, as Isaac did, because it was his Father's will that he should die for the sins of the world. This time, no angel would intervene. For Isaac, God stepped in to stop the sacrifice. From his only Son, God turned away as Jesus cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

So long before in Eden, God had decreed the penalty of death for all who sinned and rebelled against him, from Adam and Eve and Cain, all the way down to our day and beyond. But what God demanded, he provided. He provided the lamb of sacrifice, the lamb born in a stable in Bethlehem. Jesus, the perfect, innocent Son of God, carried our sins in his own body to the tree of the cross, and there he endured the penalty of death that we earned for ourselves. On that mountaintop place of death, a hill we call Mount Calvary, God provided a sacrifice.

Jesus was taken down from the cross and buried. But as Abraham had believed so long before, this is a God who raises the dead. On the third day, on the first Easter morning, Jesus rose from the dead, victorious over sin and death, victorious over that tempting serpent. God exalted him, raising him to his right hand, giving him all authority in heaven and on earth. Jesus is the firstborn from the dead. On the Last Day when Jesus returns, we who trust in him will be raised up bodily from our graves to share his glory and live in his presence forever. Abraham trusted the promises of God, and so do we, for we have his promise in Scripture: "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn among many brothers" (Romans 8:28-29). The Lord provides and he provided for us exactly what we needed, a lamb of sacrifice. Through faith in Jesus Christ, through Baptism, we are born again as God's sons and daughters. We have an inheritance in heaven, an inheritance that was won for us by the firstborn Son of Mary and Son of God. That precious firstborn Son, born in a stable in Bethlehem, is God's own Son and Mary's firstborn, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, who takes away our sin. Amen.

Jesus, Lamb of God, with your humble birth, your perfect life and your death and res-

urrection, you fulfilled the promises of God. You were offered up as the lamb of sacrifice for the sake of our salvation. Jesus, son of Mary and Son of God, **hear our prayer and accept our praise.** 

Jesus, Lamb of God, we pray that you would work through us to comfort people who are ill or fearful, those who doubt and those who are trapped in the darkness of sin. Give us opportunities to serve them in love and share with them the good news of salvation. Jesus, son of Mary and Son of God, hear our prayer and accept our praise.

Jesus, Lamb of God, you are the firstborn from the dead, and we will follow you into eternal life. We look forward to your Second Advent, that glorious day when you will raise us up from our graves as you were raised. We will live in your presence for all eternity, praising you then as we praise you now. Jesus, son of Mary and Son of God, hear our prayer and accept our praise.

Jesus, Lamb of God, even when we walk in the midst of trouble, you preserve us, deliver us, and fulfill your purpose for us. According to your steadfast love, grant healing and wholeness to those who are mourning as they deal with tremendous loss, we ask that you continue to send healing to those dealing with illness and recovery. We lift up those within our congregation and those that have reached out to us for prayers, Jeff, Kirk, Brent, Paxley, Vern, Veronica, Lisa, Kaylee and TeAnna and all of those that we now name silently in our own hearts. Jesus, son of Mary and Son of God, hear our prayer and accept our praise.
