


Perley Lutheran Parish January 31st, 2021 Fourth Sunday of Epiphany

Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

Children's Message

Do you know what this is? Sure you do. It is a remote control. Some of you may have a TV that has a remote control. When you are watching TV, you can turn the TV off or on, change channels, and adjust the volume.

Let's see how well you respond when I click one of these buttons on the remote. I will click it and call out what it is and you can act out what you think that would look like. Ready?

Wow, you all did a great job following the commands of the remote control.

Do you know what? There are some remote controls that can do much more than that. I have seen some remote controls that can control up to fifteen different things -- they are called universal remote controls. If you have a DVD player, it can control that too. You can go fast forward, slow motion, reverse, or pause a movie while you go and get a snack. When you have a universal remote control, you are in complete control. That's amazing, isn't it?

In our Bible lesson today, Jesus showed people His amazing control of everything around Him. It was on the Sabbath day and Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. There was a man there who was possessed by an evil spirit. When

Jesus went near him, the man cried out, "What do you want with us, Jesus? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are; you are the holy one of God."

"Be quiet!" Jesus said. Then He spoke to the evil spirit, "Come out!" Do you know what happened? The evil spirit did exactly what Jesus commanded. It came out of the man.

The Bible tells us that the people were amazed. They looked at one another and asked, "What's going on here? Even evil spirits obey his orders." There was power in the words that Jesus spoke that day. On that day, Jesus came in and took control of the life of that man. His life would never be the same!

Jesus wants to be in control of your life, too. He wants to be in control of the plans you make, the words you say, the things you do, and the places you go. Why? Is He a control freak? No! He wants to be in control because He wants what is best for you. The Bible tells us that God has a plan for us. It is a good plan that will give us hope and a bright future, but we will never see that plan work unless we allow Jesus to be in control.

Dear God, we want Jesus to be in control of our life. We know that He wants what is best for us and that is what we want too. In Jesus' name we pray, amen.

Message

Grace and peace to you, from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen

Well, it's January 31st – end of the first month of 2021 and I know we had all hoped that the end of 2020 would bring a much better year to all of us. At this point – it's not happened quite yet has it?? Sure we have a vaccine – actually a handful of vaccines that are being administered or are coming down the pipeline. There seems to be a bit of a feeling of hope and promise that we are turning the corner in all that is going on. When I think about the Gospel this morning it makes me think of good news and I wonder what good news today would look like – right now – if we could see it in the news. Imagine the headlines read......

Back to normal – we have conquered the pandemic! If only! Or maybe – **Masks no longer needed!** Won't that be nice?! Maybe headlines of good news would say that we have lessened the divide within our nation. I pray for this one daily. How about – **Everyone is fed and there is no more hunger or thirst in this world**? The list could go on and on of great news that we would LOVE to see in our lives and in our world. Our Gospel talks about the good news of "the time being fulfilled, and the kingdom being near. That we should repent and believe in the good news.

This good news this morning comes with the use of the word repent. Of course, we've talked about repentance many times. Most of the time we understand repentance to mean us "turning away from sin and turning towards God." The context in this passage however, may be more literal. The translation of the words repent in this passage mean "to change one's mind" or "to change one's perspective."

It's actually really only been just weeks since we celebrated Christmas and like many people, I'm sure you were flipping through the channels on TV during the holiday season and ran across the movie "A Christmas Carol". They play it over and over during the month of December, don't they? Scrooge has an idea of life and Christmas at the beginning of the movie that is not one of good, generosity, joy or care, is it?? It take him seeing Christmas past, present, and future through his own eyes to transform and "change his mind" about what Christmas is and how different it can be for him and others if he does so. Scrooge repented – he realized his initial understanding of things wasn't what he needed and wanted and "changed his mind" "changed his perspective" and Christmas became a much lovelier and loving time for everyone.

In our Gospel the kingdom of God has come and a new age is beginning with Jesus. He invites those who come to see him to live in this reality of the good news he is teaching. We however must change our perspective – our understanding of life and death. We need to understand that it is more than just this human body that we live in today – but rather we exist beyond the physical – we are also spiritual and eternal because of Jesus. We can feel and sense and even catch glimpses of God's movement in our world today if we have faith in him.

Think back to life in the time of Jesus – people really didn't have very much control of their lives. The rulers decide how people would live. Your social status meant everything. There wasn't the science and the medical understanding that we have today. Basically people were at the mercy of uncontrollable forces in that time. If they got sick or were hungry they really didn't have a lot they could do. Feast or famine, good luck or bad – they just were dealt it and had no defense or remedy against it. And then came Jesus.

Jesus comes into our world and he comes with authority and control. He reveals his authority in our passage today as he preaches to those gathered this day in the synagogue in Capernaum. The Bible tells us that as he spoke "people were amazed at the way he taught." They were amazed at how he taught with authority. Jesus comes to them with authority over the forces of evil and the dread of sickness. Again, we have all these modern, miraculous medical resources at our fingertips – I mean they have created many vaccines against COVID in just a matter of months for example. Or how about hunger and shelter and resources that we have today to keep us fed and keep us warm. All of those give us a perhaps false sense of control in our lives and our environments. These resources, amenities, can give us a perspective that WE are the ones pulling the strings and controlling our lives. And then tragedy strikes – we lose loved ones to illness, we experience tragedy in the form of natural disaster – something that wakes us up and helps us to remember that we aren't in control. It's a way for us to understand and to realize that we too have to repent – change our perspective, change our minds – see Jesus as the one true authority for us and our way to the kingdom of God.

We live in a world of uncontrollable forces – forces that affect and change our lives as we know them. These forces are beyond our control but we too can't let those forces drive us to live in fear of what might happen to us or worry day and night about what's to come. Sometimes those forces seem so big - like greed, prejudice, racism, sexism, hunger, poverty the list goes on and on and they seem so overwhelming. But guess what, they may be overwhelming to us but they are not greater or not bigger or stronger than our God.

Believing and understanding this can change our lives. We can see it. We can touch it. We can change our lives if we allow God to be the one in control. Jesus casts out those unclean spirits – the evil and the bad. Sure, we haven't been possessed like our Gospel tells us of the man in the synagogue. We can, however, understand and believe at times that we too are unclean and sometimes even unacceptable. That's where God comes in. God comes into our lives and forgives us. God give us grace and cleans us from our sinful self because of the sins that Jesus paid for us in death.

Maybe you know or have had times in your life when you feel sick – maybe not physically sick but emotionally or spiritually. Maybe you lost a loved one and you wonder how to go on, where God is in the pain and the loss, why your loved one was taken. Maybe you're dealing with an illness that just is taking over your thinking and sleeping and functioning because of the worry of what is to come. Maybe you just long for time where people love and care for each other rather than push people away or put down others because they aren't thinking or believing the same as you do. Maybe it's just a time in your life when you are tired of it all – tired of what's gone in this world and tired of knowing that you can't fix or help everyone. God brings life and wholeness into our lives. We know what it feels like – like this leper in our story – to be excluded, marginalized and maybe even ignored. God comes to us. Jesus proclaims to us that God accepts us just as we are. We are his – sick and broken. We are his and he loves us through it all.

God changes our lives and the lives of those around us. Changes that happen here and now – day in and day out. These changes aren't saved or reserved for us only in the life to come. Jesus gives us these changes now as the kingdom of God has come already. We are called to change our perspective. To see God's kingdom in our own world today. Knowing that God has done for us in our lives and seeing God's work in the lives of others we can follow the example of our gospel today. We can follow the leper's example to tell everyone what God has done.

Jesus' authority – his power and knowledge – extend far beyond our story today. His authority extends to us each and every day. He is completely in control and we, as believers, have nothing to fear. We can rest in the assurance that he will be there to help us through. That he will see us through it all and help us to enjoy the grace that only God can offer. Amen.






