Invocation

For centuries, the church has used through Advent a series of antiphons, or responses, to prepare our hearts to celebrate Christ's birth. These seven responses, names and titles for our Savior, are often called the "O Antiphons," familiar to us in the hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." We light the fourth candle on the Advent wreath in praise to Christ, who holds the Key of David, who is himself the Key who opens heaven to us. Through the prophet Isaiah, God said, "I will place on his shoulder the key of the house of David."

- C "He shall open, and none shall shut; and he shall shut, and none shall open" (Isaiah 22:22).
- P O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel, controlling at your will the gate of heaven; come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death;
- C And lead your captive people into freedom.

Lighting of the Advent Candle

This morning, we light four candles: the candles of hope, peace, joy, and today's candle love. This candle reminds us that God so loved the world, he sent his only son, so that whoever believes in him should not perish but have life everlasting. Today we celebrate

God's gift of love and remember that we have been commanded to love others as God loves us.

Confession and Absolution

- P Let us confess our sins to God and ask his forgiveness.
- C Almighty God, through Christ our Savior you have opened to us the door to eternal life, yet so often we lock our hearts and minds against you. We turn from your will and Word and follow our own selfish desires. We have sinned against you in our thoughts, words and actions. Have mercy on us and forgive us.

C Lord Jesus, lead us to live as people who have been set free!

Message: "Come, O Key of David,"

Grace and Peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen

The account from the Old Testament, events in the history of Israel's kings, does not start out like a Christmas story—but it gets there!

After the reigns of David and Solomon, Israel split into two kingdoms, Israel in the north and Judah in the south. Over time, the two weakened kingdoms fell subject to the Assyrian empire. First Israel in the north rebelled and was conquered, its people taken captive and sent into exile in Assyria. Then during the reign of King Hezekiah,

who was a good and God-fearing king, the kingdom of Judah rebelled against Assyria. Threatened with destruction, Judah gave in and paid a tribute of gold and silver to Assyria, but it is not enough. The Assyrian king sent his messengers to Jerusalem to threaten Judah with destruction. The messengers mocked the God of Israel. They boasted that the gods of other nations had not saved those people. They ridiculed the people of Judah and said their God would not be able to save them either. There would be no escape.

King Hezekiah of Judah sent his servants to listen to the Assyrian threats. Among these servants was Eliakim, the manager of the king's household. After hearing the Assyrian threats and their ridicule of Israel's God, Eliakim and his fellow servants tore their robes in anguish. Yet Eliakim did not sugar-coat the message. He faithfully reported the threats and mockery to the king. Hezekiah next sent them to Isaiah the prophet, who told the king that God would save Israel—and so he did. When the time came, just one angel killed 185,000 Assyrian troops and the Assyrian king returned home in disgrace, where he was killed by his own sons.

No, not much Advent or Christmas cheer to be found there, until the prophet Isaiah singles out Eliakim as a faithful messenger. Into the hands of this faithful messenger is committed the authority of the king's household. Eliakim will have the key to the house of David, the royal house. His authority is absolute. When he opens a door, no one will be able to shut it. If he locks a door, no one will be able to open it. The prophet places faithful Eliakim squarely on the road through Advent to Christmas, because Eliakim is a picture of another faithful messenger to come.

The word of God through Isaiah is fulfilled in Jesus, the Child of Bethlehem. Jesus, like Eliakim, is the faithful messenger, the "faithful witness" (Revelation 1:5). Jesus said of himself, "When you have lifted up the Son of Man, then you will know that I am he, and that I do nothing on my own authority, but speak just as the Father taught me" (John 8:28). Jesus carried out the work that his Father sent him to do. As Eliakim was once forced to listen to the Assyrian officials mock the God of Israel, so Jesus endured the ridicule of his opponents. Religious officials mocked his claim to be the Messiah. Soldiers beat him and crowned him with thorns, making a mockery of his kingship. Even as he hung on the cross, his enemies ridiculed the ability of Israel's God to save: "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Christ of God, his Chosen One!" (Luke 23:35).

His enemies mocked his claim, but it was true. Jesus was and is the Christ, the Chosen One of God. He did not save himself because he died on the cross to save us. By his death he destroyed the power of death and the devil, and was raised up in victory on the third day. Israel's God most certainly has the power to save, and it was a

power shown in the manger, in the cross and in the empty tomb.

Even though we may have no sympathy for those Assyrian officials who mocked the God of Israel, we may have more in common with them than we like to admit. We are called to be faithful, but we may at times have our doubts about God's ability to save. Sometimes we too worship other gods, whether money or possessions, relationships or popularity. We like to make ourselves gods, too, so that we can make our own decisions when our desires do not line up with God's commands. Even at Christmas, when we remember Jesus' birth, we may let our busy lives block out the one whose birth we are going to celebrate.

Like Eliakim of Judah, Jesus, the faithful messenger of the house of David, sees and hears our complaints and our doubt and our sins. He did not respond in kind, but took our sins onto himself and carried them to the cross. There he suffered and died for the sin and mockery and selfishness that mark our lives. As the apostle Peter wrote of Jesus the faithful witness: "He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:22-24).

In the book of Revelation Jesus is described as the holy one who holds the key of David, "who opens and no one will shut, who shuts and no one opens." Jesus is the faithful steward, the manager, of the kingdom of God, of the household of God. All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to the crucified and risen Lord. By his death and resurrection, Jesus has unlocked the kingdom of heaven for us. He is the Door to salvation and he is the Key who has unlocked forgiveness for us. He has given those keys and that authority to his people on earth, to his Church. When you hear the announcement that your sins are forgiven, it is as sure as if Jesus himself were speaking, because he is speaking, through his Church.

Very soon we will celebrate the birth of Christ our Savior, who was faithful in all things to his heavenly Father, just as Eliakim was faithful in his service to the king. At Christmas we will celebrate the good news that those tiny hands of the infant in Bethlehem's manger hold the key that unlocks the kingdom of heaven for us. Amen.
